I am writing to offer public comment in regards to agenda item #7 at the May 11, 2021 board meeting. As a district 1 resident, homeowner, commuter, and recreater, I am asking you to keep the JFK Drive temporary closure in place 24/7 during the current outreach process (and I also support permanent safe recreation space free of cars in Golden Gate Park). Keeping JFK Drive open to people to safely recreate has given myself and others a place to breathe, play, and enjoy the city during the current health orders and we must keep this momentum up for future SF generations! During the public outreach process this summer, we must address the needs of people with disabilities, communities of color, and further-from-the park neighborhoods that have expressed concerns about access to the park. Please approve Director Tumlin's request for a one-year extension of the safe JFK Drive promenade and work towards addressing the accessibility and equity needs within the park while keeping the space safe and open to people.

I reject the narrative that opening JFK Drive to cars solves any of these real issues and I challenge the working group and framework to tackle these solvable issues while making safe, open, car-free streets a named priority, not an afterthought. It is important to me to emphasize that we can have a small car-free portion of a road in a park, and also allow and encourage folks to drive to the same park, on other open roads with open parking, to also enjoy the attractions and car-free spaces - it is a false dichotomy that these cannot both happen. We can also add ADA parking, improve transit, and make bikeshare feasible in our largest park - it is an exciting chance to do it all instead of returning to the "old normal" of high-injury traffic inside of a park where drivers, bikers, walkers, kids, and elders were all frustrated. This outreach process and opportunity to create permanent safe park space is a chance for San Francisco to be a national leader both in prioritizing sustainable transportation and access to our parks, and in making our parks a destination in and of themselves - let's do it!

Please consider ALL San Franciscans before closing off free and accessible parking to the de Young (the City's museum). I am distressed that the JFK Drive permanent closure is being considered. I understand that a compromise was already made, with Sunday and 6 month Saturday closures of the street. Necessary and hard fought equitable ADA parking spots are currently lost to visitors with disabilities, not to mention free parking spaces on JFK for visitors and students who are not wealthy enough to live close by. Not everyone is able bodied enough to ride into the park, or able to afford the Music Concourse Parking Garage, which is prohibitively expensive. As a person of color, I have observed very few people of color enjoying the museums. This closure will also negatively impact people of color in higher percentages than your white museum goers. I do not support the closure of JFK in Golden Gate Park as it is a form of recreation redlining. As a parent, creative, grantmaker for the arts, and former FAMSF staff member this closure limits accessibility for folks living in San Francisco and local tourists that reside outside of the city. It already costs a bare minimum of \$20-30 in gas/toll/BART/SFMTA to get into the city, then you add garage fees of \$50+ for a 3hr visit and a trip for one person to visit the park becomes a near \$100 expense.

That being said, families that were forced out due to the extremely high cost of living in SF and bordering countries are moving further out and cannot return to these institutions or to visit the park literally because it's costs too much and it's too cumbersome to find parking. If you have ever lived with a small child, you know parking is EVERYTHING when it comes to those family experiences. And the way crime is in Civic Center, I would strongly not recommend any family, friend, senior, etc to take public transit out to the park. It's simply not safe.

Moreover, this closure trickles up to school classes visiting the museums on buses from around the state. Those buses are too big to fit in a garage and JFK was the only solution. When JFK is closed down, it will drastically reduce access for schools that take day trips as far out as Fresno county just to see art and science, thus limiting crucial access to the arts and sciences institutions that are not present in predominantly black and brown communities.

I sincerely hope this policy is reviewed for equity and access for people of color, families, seniors, folks with disabilities, and anyone else dealing with the crippling effects of inflation and gentrification regardless of their SF residency status. It is truly a "privilege" to afford San Francisco.

My name is Karen Berniker and I am a person with a dual disability (Deaf/Bllind) who works as the Access Manager at the deYoung Museum. PLEASE NOTE, I do NOT support the ongoing JFK closure because it does not consider ALL San Franciscans before closing off free and accessible parking to the de Young (the City's museum). This is very concerning as my job is to ensure the museum is ADA compliant, and that there is equal access for people with disabilities to the museum. I am affected by this decision both personally and professionally because the necessary and equitable ADA parking spots are currently lost thereby making it extremely inaccessible to visitors with disabilities, not to mention free parking spaces on JFK for visitors and students who are not wealthy enough to live close by, able bodied enough to ride into the park, or able to afford the Music Concourse Parking Garage, which is prohibitively expensive. Having this specific area along JFK Drive closed directly takes away the ability of myself and others with disabilities to equitably enjoy the park and the museums located there, and there is no equivalent replacement. Meaning other ADA parking spaces in the area are not the closest parking spaces to the museum and are considered inaccessible for people with mobility conditions or people who are blind a use a white cane as the pavement is not smooth. Please consider the needs of ALL San Franciscans and do not allow those who are privileged to take advantage of the situation.

Dear County Transportation Authority Commissioners,

Please DO NOT close JFK Drive permanently! It would be a disastrous move to do so! At this time of severely reduced Muni Service and fears about Covid-19, more and more San Franciscans are driving than ever before. While this is a far from ideal situation, it points up the reality of the problems all of us will face if JFK Drive is closed to cars. All of the beloved facilities along JFK Drive that San Franciscans from more distant neighborhoods--like the Mission, Excelsior, OMI, Portola, Visitacion Valley and Hunter's Point--enjoy visiting will be largely inaccessible to them. This will be an especially difficult state of affairs for low income working families, particularly families of color.

And, San Franciscans with disabilities and seniors will have an even harder time accessing the Conservatory of Flowers, the Rhododendron Dell, The de Young Museum, the Academy of Sciences, the Japanese Tea Garden and Stow Lake than they have already if they cannot reach these wonderful facilities by road, and have nearby free or low-cost parking available to them. As you know, seniors and people with disabilities often live on fixed incomes, and prohibitively expensive garage parking that is not close enough to these facilities is not a workable alternative for them. I know, because I am one of them!

The traffic problems caused by the closure of JFK Drive will extend far beyond Golden Gate Park, and on busy weekends, may even cause congestion on the Golden Gate Bridge to the north and 19th Avenue to the south. This would not be a desirable situation for anyone.

Please DO take the time and effort to think creatively and design a roadway that will be safe for both bicyclists and motorists. As someone who has recently witnessed the tragedy of a bicyclist being hit by a car, I take bicyclists' safety seriously. I strongly believe that it will be very possible to have separate, safe pathways for both cars and bicyclists that are wide enough, and separate enough, to be safe for all who use them. The principle of full inclusion is basic to civil

Please consider ALL San Franciscans before closing off free and accessible parking to the de Young (the City's museum) in favor of petitions from predominately white and upper income bike riders and walkers. I am distressed as a life long city resident that JFK Drive permanent closure is being considered by this body of San Francisco Government Officials.

Necessary and equitable ADA parking spots are currently lost to visitors with disabilities, free parking spaces on JFK Drive for visitors and students who are not wealthy enough to live nearby, able to ride into the park, or able to afford the Music Concourse Parking Garage, that is prohibitively expensive and not under the Museums' control.

San Francisco is known for many things and one of them is its world class museums one of which is located in Golden Gate Park. The DeYoung Museum has attracted San Franciscans across many age groups but one of it most faithful groups is retirees. Once the work of a lifetime is completed man seek the solace and the beauty found in art. They do this by becoming members of the museum and visiting on a regular basis. Many also become volunteers believing it is time to give back some of what San Francisco has offered them. Of the volunteer group many are traveling from outside the city to work at the museum. The City recently has a strange way to thank them for their patronage and their service by closing JFK Drive completely every day. JFK has provided free parking close by the museum both for volunteers and regular visitors as well as for the handicapped. Many volunteers have said they will no longer be able to work their shifts if they cannot park. The garage is too expensive for people on a fixed income and during popular exhibitions there are not enough parking spaces. For evening events you really cannot expect elderly people and unaccompanied women to walk safely though a dark park back and forth to the museum. Taking public transportation is not a reliable choice especially on the weekends. Many older patrons do not feel safe on San Francisco public transportation. I have attempted to take the bus from Noe Valley to the museum for my volunteer shifts on several occasions. The bus never followed the schedule, on the weekend it didn't start early enough To go from my house in Noe Valley by car takes 15 minutes while by bus the few times I tried almost an hour. My time is a valuable as a fully employed person. I don't like wasting it. On two occasions when the bus never appeared I was able to walk the distance in 40 minutes. I am not your average 76 year old and this is not a viable solution.

If you thought the closure of JFK impacts only seniors you would be wrong. As a former private school teacher I know that parents drove my kids to the museum when we visited. Parking in the garage would be an expense shouldered by the school which would make visits impossible. Private schools that come from outside the City would be unable to park and thus unable to come. Your plan to have bikers and walkers would exclude many others including school children denying them the cultural experience the museum offers.

The museum loading dock are located off JFK. The closure would make bringing in and taking out exhibits problematic. The evening and daytime functions that the museum has for openings and other meetings and gettogethers would also become difficult with the loading and unloading of supplies. This closure would severely impact the operation of the museum.

If there is no place to park on JFK patrons, museum staff, volunteers, and school groups would be forced to park in the surrounding neighborhoods. This would increase traffic in the neighborhoods and disappear all their parking. Parking meters would not solve the problem but rather turn more people away.

If staff and volunteers are forced to park only on Martin Luther Drive moving cars would be very difficult every 4 hours to prevent getting a parking ticket. We would be forced to disrupt our work for longer periods to move cars. Parking tickets in the park are very expensive for those unlucky enough to not move their car in time.

The pandemic has place a huge financial burden on the museum leaving it millions of dollars in debt. There would be no way to recoup the losses with the planed JFK closure.

We are only asking to keep open JFK from Transverse Drive to 8th Avenue. That still leaves a considerable stretch of JFK closed to traffic for bikers and walkers. Once we are all back to work and back to school in September there will be very little traffic on JFK during the week so to close it would not make sense. Only the weekends will there be crowds and JFK will be closed, I am assuming, as it was last year, pre-pandemic, on Sunday. This was hard and we suffered with a lack of Sunday volunteers but it is a positive trade off. The museum is closed except for staff, museum work and special events on Mondays and there is really little traffic in the park then. So also no need to close JFK.

The plan to close JFK is both exclusionary and shortsighted. I hope you reconsider.

Dear Commissioners:

It feels as if this is a done deal and the meetings and surveys regarding making the road closure of JFK Drive permanent are just a theater performance. That being said, since this process is going forward, please accept the survey with a couple of caveats: before final approval please include in the graph on how many parking spaces there are in nearby amenities, please include how many parking spaces there are all along JFK Drive. Also, in the graph which describes collisions East of Transverse Drive, it says a total of 91, pedestrian 20 (21%), bicycles 40 (43.9%), leaving the assumption that 31 involved vehicles which would mean that more bicycles were involved in collisions that were cars. Please clarify. Does this mean that 20 pedestrians collided with other pedestrians?

As a lifelong San Franciscan, I remember Golden Gate Park fondly for the drives our family took every evening along what is now called JFK Drive. The evening drive was the highlight of our day as a family together. Rabbits and squirrels would line up along the road, and we would throw them bread and peanuts.

Then for decades, JFK Drive was closed every Sunday and every holiday of the year. The bicyclists and roller skaters had the road every day that folk were off and available to picnic, but at least the working class had access on Saturdays. Then in 2007 after the rollerbladers and the bicyclists demanded more road closure, partly in revenge because the deYoung Museum and the California Academy of Sciences had rebuilt their museums for the people in Golden Gate Park, JFK Drive was closed from April 1 - October 1 each year. This denied those of us who cannot walk distances access. But at least we had October 1 - April 1 to enjoy the Conservatory of Flowers and the other park amenities.

Now that the entire road was closed this past year, those of us with limited mobility were denied the pleasure of enjoying the light show at the Conservatory of Flowers and the lighted sculpture exhibit in the evenings. It is unrealistic to say "Let them take the shuttle". Many of us cannot take even one step, so we cannot step up into a shuttle. Do not expect us to stand in the cold darkness waiting for a shuttle. That is just cruel.

This is not fair. Everyone deserves access to all of the amenities in Golden Gate Park. Please reopen JFK Drive to everyone.

Then there is the economic discrimination. Those of you who are attorneys or who are married to one can earn \$400 per hour. There is no way that you can truly understand what it is to be the head of a family trying to provide some happiness to your children and needing to drive to Golden Gate Park to enjoy it, maybe take the family to see the wonders made by the people of Africa, Oceania, and the Native Americas when the deYoung Museum is free admission to all Bay Area residents every Saturday, (A new policy initiated by the new director Thomas Campbell) when you earn minimum wage and yearn to drive along the road, then simply pull up and park, then take your family walking through the park to the deYoung Museum.

If you claim to not have a car but you take Uber, Lyft, or other such services, you not only have a car, but you have a driver, who is underpaid and without benefits and pays for their own insurance and car maintenance. In other words, you have a car and a driver who is exploited.

There is an alternative site, perfect for a road closure; Middle Drive right on the western side of Transverse Drive. It is quiet, sylvan, with a little lake, with a flat, smooth, newly paved pavement.

Those who are demanding the permanent road closure of JFK Drive seem to have a bullying, smirking presence. They do not care how much hardship they are causing those who need to drive to Golden Gate Park to access its amenities. This feels very wrong and unfair. Please reopen JFK Drive to everyone now that we are in the yellow tier.

An approach that suggests that children's safety is well-served by putting up signs to remind motorists not to hit them centers the interests of drivers above the safety of children. This is simply unacceptable, in any time or place, but especially when we are speaking of a park. In a place where the safety of children should come first, second and third, it's being treated as an afterthought.

I will additionally note that the fact that this framework does not acknowledge the safety and well-being of children as a primary guiding principle for their efforts is not an accident. Disability Access

Many of the suggested parking spaces recommended as replacements for those currently on JFK are not that easy for disabled people to navigate to their desired destination. This is especially true of the spots behind the bandshell where the footing is very uneven. Others are too far for disabled people to easily walk to the points of interest around the Music Concourse. Additionally, it's not only those who are legally disabled who have mobility issues. Some individuals cannot quality for a handicapped placard but they still have difficulty walking significant distances.

Parking Garage

The parking garage, which I supported when it was proposed and still do, is expensive and not everyone can afford to park there. Even for those who can afford it, when there are major shows at the de Young or other special attractions, the garage fills up and cars are stuck on MLK Drive coming from both the east and the west, waiting for a spot to open. The garage is helpful but it's not a panacea.

Muni Access

The pandemic has decimated our public transportation. To use one of the Muni routes that accesses the Park, one must be able to access the Muni line. The three lines closest to the Park, the 5, 7 and 44 are not necessarily close to those who want to visit the Park. I live in Golden Gate Heights where there is no longer any Muni option so it's not feasible to take the bus.

With the limit on the number of passengers there's no guarantee that people will be allowed to board. Taking the bus is particularly difficult not only for the disabled and those with mobility issues, but families with diaper bags, strollers and picnic baskets face significant obstacles in trying to use the buses. And the walk from the bus stop at 9th and Lincoln to e.g., the de Young, is pretty far for anyone not physically fit.

Attractions for All

I object to the characterization of those advocating for opening JFK as elitist. Whatever you think of the trustees and boards of the organizations in the east end of the Park, remember that their financial contributions helped both build and maintain the attractions. But more importantly remember that there are thousands of members of the California Academy of Sciences, the de Young Museum, and the Conservatory of Flowers, who are everyday citizens. These cultural and educational institutions offer free and/or discounted programs to many of our citizens. Although located closer to MLK Drive, the Japanese Tea Garden and the Botanical Garden are

also nearby. These attract visitors not only from the surrounding neighborhoods but the entire City, the Bay Area, and visitors from all over the country and around the world. And now there's the SkyStar Ferris Wheel for the next four years.

I don't understand why the Close-JFK faction is so adamant about closing the road at the area of the Park that is home to all these urban attractions. When they talk about all the parking available in other areas of the Park, it may make sense to look at closing other roads that are not adjacent to these attractions.

Need for Open Space

Prior to the pandemic friends and I walked regularly in Golden Gate Park. We carpooled and never parked on JFK Drive but we walked along JFK on the sidewalk. There were bikers (JFK has bike lanes in both directions) and joggers and other walkers, but never so many that we couldn't easily walk on the sidewalk no matter which direction we were going nor which side of the road we walked on (always on the sidewalk). As people return to work and children return to school, I question whether there will be a need for the space in the street. Certainly I didn't see any need previously. If people are driving too fast, I'm completely in favor of additional stop signs where it makes sense and more speed humps as were added to other roads in the park, and I think to JFK as well further west.

Respectfully I ask that you reject the report and reopen JFK Drive.

The Final Report for the Golden Gate Park Working Group and Action Framework misses the mark. The framework reads like a plan to add more cars to Golden Gate Park. In the midst of a climate crisis, in a "Transit-First City", this is a failure.

The Framework rightfully should focus on facilitating access for all people, regardless of physical ability, as well as expanding access for residents of all SF neighborhoods, but WITHOUT encouraging private car traffic. A decision framework for a major recreation area must also raise the importance of providing safe space for children and seniors to walk, bike, roll, and play away from dangerous car traffic.

It must be possible to meet these accessibility needs without abandoning the City's climate and transit priorities and ignoring our most vulnerable residents' need for a safe place for recreation. The right framework would be a roadmap to meeting those need together.

The Framework before you today will bring cars into the park in force and literally drive children and seniors out of Golden Gate Park.

I am asking you to vote "no" and allow this framework to be improved.

Dear Commissioners,

I'm writing to you as a 14-year District 1 resident, and before that a 9-year District 4 resident. During my 23 years living in San Francisco, I have always lived within one block of Golden Gate Park. I have always enjoyed the peace and serenity when walking, biking, strolling with my dog, and now skating in the park. But ever since a portion of JFK Drive was closed to cars, I can honestly say that this is the first time that I have ever felt safe at any hour of the day because there are no cars driving or parked on JFK.

The park is supposed to be a place for SF residents to enjoy life and relieve stress. But as a vulnerable road user, I often felt stress and anxiety as people driving cars would cut me off or open doors in the bike lane. On top of that, I can now stroll down JFK at night. There are always people enjoying the park at any hour and I feel much safer than I ever have. It is truly a miraculous feeling to be able to enjoy a park as it is supposed to be enjoyed, and not fear for my life.

I remember when Heather Miller was killed while riding her bike on JFK by a speeding driver in 2016. Since the eastern portion of JFK has been closed to car traffic, there have been no deaths and no injuries due to collisions between vulnerable road users and cars.

Additionally, there is no commuter traffic during rush hours through the park. I can go for a morning or evening walk and not breathe emissions or hear car horns and engines. Instead I hear birds chirping, owls hoo-hoo-ing, and even once a coyote howling! Every afternoon and on weekends, I see small children learning to ride bikes and scooters up and down JFK. We should never return back to a time when cars clogged JFK Drive and made the park a high injury corridor.

This doesn't need to be a zero sum game. During the public outreach process this summer, we must address the needs of people with disabilities, communities of color, and further-from-the park neighborhoods that have expressed concerns about access to the park. Please approve Director Tumlin's request for a one-year extension of the safe JFK Drive promenade and work towards addressing the accessibility and equity needs within the park while keeping the space safe and open to people. It is not an either/or situation. It's a yes/and situation. We can envision a Golden Gate Park that is at once equitable, accessible, sustainable, safe for everyone, climate-friendly and carfree.

Now is the time to create a new version of Golden Gate Park that will be a model for cities across the United States. I'm ready to help make it happen!
